The role of a foster parent/carer

In the role of a foster parent/carer, you will provide nourishment, support the wellbeing of the child or young person, foster their growth and development, and offer guidance and a secure base to enable any child to feel safe. However, it is important to recognise that there are distinct differences when parenting a child in foster care compared to a biological child. These disparities need to be understood and considered throughout the foster parenting journey.

Training

As a foster parent, your learning continues to grow with you along your journey, which is an incredible opportunity. Each new child you care for will have different needs, so we offer ongoing training and continued advice and support.

Education


A key responsibility of any foster parent is ensuring the children in your care attend school and that you are an advocate for their learning and education. When a child or young person has moved homes, keeping the routine and structure of school is often important.

Contact with the birth family

Taking foster children to visit family might be with a variety of family members such as parents, grandparents and siblings. It might be a supervised visit or very informal depending on the family circumstances. Contact with family can be an emotional experience for children and any child you look after will need your support, understanding and empathy.


Can I become an

Aspris foster parent/carer?

To become a foster carer with us, you don't need any formal qualifications or experience. When joining us, you will receive thorough training and an induction into Aspris but some skills can't be taught and you will bring with you various life skills. These include:

- The time and energy to invest in a child or young person
- The ability to communicate effectively, not only with children and young people but also with social workers, the child's families and others concerned with the wellbeing of the child or young person
- The ability to be flexible and non-judgemental, as well as being patient and understanding
- A spare bedroom/s for your foster child
- A valid driving licence and access to a car
- Access to a computer and the internet
- A sense of humour and dedication to bringing joy to the lives of children and young people

You can apply to be a foster carer regardless of your marital status, sexuality or residential status. Foster carers come from diverse backgrounds, which reflect our children and young people who are in need of stable and caring home environments.





How do I apply to become an Aspris foster parent/carer?

Get in touch

The first step is to enquire about joining our services by either telephone or email. It might be that you'd prefer an informal conversation first, which we are happy to do so and answer any questions you might have at this stage. After this initial contact, we can then support you through the next steps where we will arrange a home visit to find out a little more about you.

After we have met with you, you'll then need to complete an application form and return it to us. Please note, enhanced criminal record and medical checks will be undertaken at this stage. Once this has been completed, your home study assessment (Form F) will begin and we will then request references.

After a successful application and following completion of your checks, you will be enrolled onto our Skills to Foster course to begin your training and induction with Aspris.

What happens during the assessment process?

All foster carers must be assessed by a specialist social worker. Once the assessment has been carried out successfully, both the foster carer and the social worker will attend an independent fostering panel to be officially approved as a professional foster carer.

At the meeting, they will look through your Form F to discuss the type of fostering placement that's right for you and make recommendations about your suitability to be approved as a foster parent. Those who are new to fostering may think the fostering panel sounds intimidating however, most people find this both a positive and rewarding experience.

How long will the assessment process take?

It usually takes around four to six months to complete your fostering assessment. This gives you plenty of time to think things through and not rush into any decisions. We'll work at your speed, so there's no need to hurry. Our goal is to make sure that by the end of the assessment, all the important aspects of why you want to foster and why you're a great fit have been showcased. Whilst this process can take around four to six months, we will aim for the assessment to be completed sooner if possible.

Once you're approved as a foster carer, we'll begin the process of finding the perfect child or young person for you. At Aspris Fostering Services, we are keen to involve foster carers in their placement matching so you'll have the final say when it comes to welcoming a child into your home.
